WHEREAS, the Village of Avon (hereinafter the "Village") maintains the combined Reservoir Road and Valve Vault Project; and

WHEREAS, the Village is proposing "construction of water system improvements, to include upgrades to the Town's Avon-Lima Road tank and its service area, and upgrades to the Village's Reservoir Road tank and its service area, including, without limitation, upgrades to the Town's Avon-Lima tank and service area consisting of installing a Trihalomethane (THM) removal system, and upgrades to the Village's Reservoir Road tank consisting of restoration of the Reservoir Road tank including blasting and recoating the tank, installing separate inlet and outlet pipes including related upgrades to the tank's valve vaults and valve systems, installing a mixing system and Trihalomethane (THM) removal system, and installing a pressure reducing valve station and

approximately 300 feet of new water main to allow the tank to be taken offline for service, and upgrades to the distribution system to include abandoning the Avon-Lima PRV, adjusting the controls for the Lakeville PRV, and Pole Bridge – Lake PRV, changing the settings of the Lake-Genesee PRV, upgrading the Agar Road pump station control system to operate based on level in the Avon-Lima Tank, and replacing the meter in the Littleville meter pit to better measure flow into its service area" (collectively, the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Village has hired MRB Group to develop a Preliminary Engineering Report for the project with a total project cost estimate of \$4,700,000; and

WHEREAS, the Village is seeking financial assistance through the 2023 NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation's Water Infrastructure Improvement Act Program; and

WHEREAS, the grant application requires that the applicant adopt a resolution that authorizes: the undertaking of the project and the maximum total cost of the project; expenditures for the project, including identification of any non-municipal source of funds; obligation of funds necessary to meet any required local match, including any cash and/or in-kind services; and when applicable, the submission of an application for financial assistance. The resolution must also designate a representative of the applicant who is authorized to sign the funding agreement with EFC and any associated documents.

NOW, THERFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Village of Avon Village Board identifies the Village Treasurer as the authorized representative of the Village to submit the WIIA grant application on behalf of the Village and execute all associated documents relative to and as required for the grant application, financial application, and funding agreement, as applicable; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village may be obligated to provide local matching funds totaling at least 40% of the Project Costs in the form of in-kind services or cash contributions appropriated through State Revolving Fund (SRF) or other approved financing or funds, in accordance with the Bond Resolution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Village Board of the Village of Avon, fully supports the Project and submission of the 2023 WIIA grant application by BPD, Inc. on behalf of the Village to improve water quality and protect public health.

WHEREAS, the purpose hereinafter described consists of water system capital improvements authorized to be undertaken by the Village Board of Trustees pursuant to the Village Law;

WHEREAS, the Village, acting as lead agency under the State Environmental Quality Review Act and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder ("SEQRA"), has completed its environmental review and, on August 9, 2023, has duly adopted a negative declaration with respect to the type I action and has determined that the implementation of the action as proposed will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts; now therefor, be it

RESOLVED BY THE VILLAGE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF AVON, NEW YORK (hereinafter referred to as the "Village"), by the favorable vote of not less than two-thirds of all of the members of such Board, as follows:

- Section 1. The Village of Avon shall undertake the construction of water system improvements, to include upgrades to the Town's Avon-Lima Road tank and its service area, and upgrades to the Village's Reservoir Road tank and its service area, including, without limitation, upgrades to the Town's Avon-Lima tank and service area consisting of installing a Trihalomethane (THM) removal system, and upgrades to the Village's Reservoir Road tank consisting of restoration of the Reservoir Road tank including blasting and re-coating the tank, installing separate inlet and outlet pipes including related upgrades to the tank's valve vaults and valve systems, installing a mixing system and Trihalomethane (THM) removal system, and installing a pressure reducing valve station and approximately 300 feet of new water main to allow the tank to be taken offline for service, and upgrades to the distribution system to include abandoning the Avon-Lima PRV, adjusting the controls for the Lakeville PRV, and Pole Bridge – Lake PRV, changing the settings of the Lake-Genesee PRV, upgrading the Agar Road pump station control system to operate based on level in the Avon-Lima Tank, and replacing the meter in the Littleville meter pit to better measure flow into its service area, and the acquisition of original furnishings, equipment, machinery or apparatus, or the replacement of such equipment, machinery or apparatus, and other incidental improvements that may be required in connection therewith for such construction and Village use (hereinafter referred to as "purpose"), and general obligation serial bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$4,700,000 and bond anticipation notes in anticipation thereof (and renewals thereof) of the Village are hereby authorized to be issued to finance said purpose.
- Section 2. The estimated aggregate maximum cost of said purpose, including preliminary costs and costs incidental thereto and costs of the financing thereof, is estimated to be \$4,700,000, and said amount is hereby appropriated therefor. The plan for financing of said purpose is to provide all of such maximum cost by issuance of obligations as herein authorized.
- Section 3. It is hereby determined and declared that (a) said purpose is one of the class of objects or purposes described in Subdivision 1 of Paragraph (a) of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, and that the period of probable usefulness of said purpose is forty (40) years, (b) the proposed maximum maturity of said bonds authorized by this resolution will be in excess of five years, (c) current funds required to be provided prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes herein authorized, pursuant to Section 107.00 of the Local Finance Law, to the extent applicable, if any, will be provided, (d) the notes herein authorized are issued in anticipation of bonds for an assessable improvement, and (e) there are presently no outstanding bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said bonds.
- Section 4. The bonds and notes authorized by this resolution shall contain the recital of validity prescribed in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law and such bonds and notes shall be general obligations of the Village and all the taxable real property in the Village is subject to the levy of *ad valorem* taxes to pay the principal thereof, and interest thereon, without limitation as to rate or amount, subject to statutory limitations, if any.
- <u>Section 5</u>. It is hereby determined and declared that the Village reasonably expects to reimburse the general fund, or such other fund as may be utilized, not to exceed the maximum amount authorized herein, from the proceeds of the obligations authorized hereby for expenditures,

if any, from such fund that may be made for the purpose prior to the date of the issuance of such obligations. This is a declaration of official intent under Treasury Regulation §1.150-2.

Section 6. The power to further authorize the sale, issuance and delivery of said bonds and notes and to prescribe the terms, form and contents of said bonds and notes, including, without limitation, the power to contract and issue indebtedness pursuant to §169.00 of the Local Finance Law, if applicable, the consolidation with other issues, the determination to issue bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, whether to authorize the receipt of bids in an electronic format, all contracts for, and determinations with respect to, credit or liquidity enhancements, if any, and to sell and deliver said bonds and notes, subject to the provisions of this resolution and the provisions of the Local Finance Law, is hereby delegated to the Village Treasurer, the Village's chief fiscal officer. The Village Treasurer and the Village Clerk or Deputy Clerk are hereby authorized to sign by manual or facsimile signature and attest any bonds and notes issued pursuant to this resolution and are hereby authorized to affix to such bonds and notes the corporate seal of the Village of Avon.

Section 7. The faith and credit of the Village of Avon, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 8. After compliance with Section 9 hereof, this resolution shall be published in full by the Village Clerk of the Village of Avon together with a notice in substantially the form prescribed by Section 81.00 of said Local Finance Law, and such publication shall be in each official newspaper of the Village, in the manner prescribed by law. The validity of said bonds and bond anticipation notes issued in anticipation of the sale of said serial bonds, may be contested only if such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Village is not authorized to expend money, or the provisions of law which should be complied with, at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty (20) days after the date of such publication; or if said obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

<u>Section 9</u>. This resolution is subject to a permissive referendum of the qualified electors of the Village of Avon, pursuant to Section 36.00 of the Local Finance Law.
